
Slusser Library Celebrates 10th

Limited Time Only IRA Opportunity!

Once in a while, a tax benefit comes along for persons who have a generous heart for charity. The 2006 Pension Protection Act provides for individuals who are 70 1/2 prior to IRA distribution to make a tax-free gift of up to \$100,000 from their traditional IRA to a qualifying charity such as the PHF. Distributions to the PHF can be used to satisfy minimum distribution requirements and initial withdrawals must be made by the end of 2006. These are not deductible; however, they are also not considered taxable income. To make an IRA donation to the PHF, write a letter to your IRA administrator to send a check to the PHF, noting that it is a distribution for charitable purposes. Volunteer Spotlight



Geoff Wadman adds a touch of British wit and wisdom to stamp sorting

Geoff Wadman comes from a small country town in southwest England, the youngest of nine children. He became interested in stamps at age 10 when school chums exposed him to the fun of collecting. After finishing his childhood parochial education, he enrolled in night school to study engineering. At 18, he served with the British Army for a couple years, then joined the City of Bristol Police. Several years later, he was encouraged by a friend to rejoin civilian life and move to the US. In March 1958, he married (Pat) and they promptly sailed to NYC on the "Queen Mary". He and Pat lived in New Jersey for over 30 years, where he worked for a public utility and raised his family of three children. In 1992 Geoff retired to Tucson, having visited the Southwest previously when his daughter attended the University of Arizona. He now has 9 grandchildren whom he describes as "lovely" and visits regularly.

Like many collectors, his stamps lay in boxes and bags during his working years. In 1999 he volunteered through his Knights of Columbus group to assist Boy Scouts with the

stamp collecting merit badge. While hunting for materials, he was referred to the PHF by the philatelic clerk at the main post office. He states "I came to the Foundation that same day and it was my element". He has been volunteering ever since that initial visit, coming every Thursday to sort commemoratives.

Geoff's collection specializes in Great Britain and he has a keen interest in other world stamps. He gets a great deal of pleasure from knowing the people at the PHF and is amazed at their level of knowledge. "I get a kick out of stamp collecting. I love to be with stamps"!
