Volunteers Take Honors At ARIPEX

ARIPEX, the annual stamp show that alternates between Tucson and Mesa, has come and gone. Many thanks to our wonderful volunteers who set up a booth and sold over \$2000 worth of stamps and supplies. Special thanks is due Bob Davis who supervised the selection of sales material.

PHF volunteers won numerous awards, for which we should be proud.

John Wynns, who helped arrange exhibits for the show, won a gold medal for his "Canadian 1927 Confederation Anniversary Issue. He also won the Best BNA Award from the British North American Philatelic Society.

Dr. "Ben" Ramkissoon won two gold medals for his "Trinidad WWI Red Cross Label That Became a Postage Stamp" and for "Air Letter Sheets (aerogramme) of Trinidad and Tobago 1943-1995". This exhibit also won the APS Medal of Excellence. His air letter sheets also won the Champion of Champions award at the Ameristamp Expo at Riverside CA.

The Vermeil Medal was won by Jim Bowman for his "First 70 Years of German Related Pictorial Postal Sta-

No one can say that our volunteers take a back seat at stamp shows! Congratulations to everyone!





The Education Program continues to muster interest from schools near and far. On most days, Sue Sisson's feet barely touch the floor, she is moving so fast to head for classes. She is to be commended for her remarkable coordination of the Youth Expo area at ARIPEX. It was a great success without any support this year from the USPS, thanks to her herculean effort! One very valuable contribution at the show was the youth exhibit section, with a winning exhibit on cats by a young girl with special learning needs. Through Sue's mentoring, this youth overcame many challenges to assemble an interesting exhibit which even won an award!

Community events continue to be an integral part of PHF youth outreach. Since December, we have presented youth stamp activities in partnership with the International Wildlife Museum, Southern AZ Transportation Museum, Tucson Family Festival and Pima County Ted Walker Youth Days. In February, Sue hosted a table at Colossal Cave's annual celebration. These events collectively reached over 500 youth. Preparations are currently underway for the Juneteenth Festival, Solstice Festival and Pima County Educators Fair.

This year's stamp show brought over 200 adult and 80 youth exhibitors and 40 dealers to the Tucson Convention Center. Everything was well coordinated and attendance was good (even with some bad weather). This was the first show in 15 years without the involvement of the USPS. Sue Sisson and her volunteers really stepped up to the plate to pull together many stamp activities for the 800 students who attended on Friday with their teachers and several hundred additional youth who attended on Saturday/Sunday with their parents. Sue noted that this year's assortment of activities had a more educational focus, rather than simple entertainment. The teachers also received a self guide sheet to encourage the classes to go through the exhibits and discuss them. Teacher feedback on this was very positive. A huge thank you goes to several Optimist Clubs, dealers, Rangers and other individuals we were able to provide the busses.

Celebrando de Tucson is

a local program founded by Lynne and Tony Urias, who are 4th generation Tucsonans. Their love of local history and desire to share it with others led to the development of experiential learning opportunities for youth and adults.

Because ARIPEX was focused on celebrating the 150th anniversary of mail delivery in Tucson, the Urias' researched the relevant postal history at our Slusser Library and created an excellent powerpoint show. Positioned near the Wells Fargo stagecoach and dressed in 1880's attire, they added a wonderful dimension to the stamp show.

Dr. Reuben (Ben) Ramkissoon won the 2007 APS Ameristamp Expo Single Frame "Champion of Champions" Award at the winter meeting in Riverside CA. His exhibit tells the full story of how a patriotic fund-raising label issued the Trinidad Red Cross Society received government sanction to be used a half penny postage stamp for one day in 1914, then reverted to its status of a patriotic label. Ben and his wife Connie live in Oak Brook, Ill and winter in Tucson,AZ and southern CA. They are frequent visitors to the PHF, where Ben volunteers in the library, does research on his many exhibits and prolific philatelic writing. He is a longtime PHF member and an Arizona Ranger. His philatelic interests span many specialized areas, including Trinidad, Tobago, Aero/Astrophilately, First Issues of the UNNY and Thematic subjects of Mahatma Gandhi and Blood Donors. A native of Trinidad, he has formed many award-winning exhibits and contributed extensively to the philatelic literature of this two-island Republic in the West Indies.

Taking a summer trip near the Grand Canyon? Be sure to stop and see Bob Bechtel's "Postal History of the Grand Canyon " stamp exhibit will be featured as part of a special exhibit at the historic Kolb Studios from April 11-July 15. Congratulations to Carl Spitzer, who was selected as the 58th member of the AZ State Philatelic Hall of Fame in October. Carl served as AZ Federation of Stamp Clubs Treasurer, Tucson Stamp Club President, and was voted Distinguished Topical Philatelist in 1995 by the American Topical Assn. The AZ Philatelic Rangers appointed him a Deputy Sher-

iff in 1990. He is a dedicated collector and active philatelist and has contributed greatly to the promotion of philately in Arizona.

The Carl Lemar John Stamp Exhibit Room was officially dedicated in late 2006. It was through Carl's personal efforts and financial gift that a room was designated for formal stamp exhibits in his name. The space allows us to showcase both in-house exhibits and guest exhibitors on a rotating basis throughout the year. The Foundation is truly grateful to Carl for his vision and generosity.

University & State Libraries Partner with PHF

The University of Arizona Special Libraries Association, an affiliate of the national organization of special libraries, recently visited the Slusser Memorial Philatelic Library. The SLA consists of students from the School of Information Resources & Library Science and their faculty advisors. One of their activities is to tour various special libraries, so in late March they paid us a visit and were entirely "wowed" by the experience and excited to share their newfound information with fellow students. The day following the tour, our program consultant presented at the UA Library Fair on internship opportunities at our Foundation. Several students indicated a strong interest in interning with us in the future and the library science faculty will be posting our information permanently on their

department website. We hope that this initial promotional endeavor will result in a fruitful long term relationship and bring talented, motivated young people to volunteer in our "very special" special library.

As part of the 2012 Arizona Statehood Centennial, the AZ State Library has created the *Arizona Memory Project*. The project is an online repository for digital collections from libraries, museums, and historical institutions. The program director has visited the PHF and encouraged us to share some of our postal history information. Efforts are underway to place material from our museum, library and youth program onto the Memory Project website.

Upon reading the request, Bill dug through large boxes of old cancellations to locate the prized Fr. Kino, which he then arranged to send to Italy. The Archbishop was totally delighted and (we hope) passed our name along to a few other Italian dignitaries!
