## The Postal History Foundation - The Early Years

In 1960 William (Bill) Alexander, who had recently moved from Pittsburgh, PA, to Tucson, gathered together a group of interested stamp collectors/philatelists the idea of establishing an organization for the study and promotion of research into the postal history (the movement of the mail in all its aspects) of Arizona and the Western United States. The core group of four included Bill (who had been Curator of Postal History and Stamps at Carnegie Museum in Pittsburgh), Arthur (Art) Springer (a past president of the Tucson Stamp Club), Albert Evans (past president of the Arizona Federation of Stamp Clubs), and Omega Williamson (a past president of the Tucson Stamp Club

with extensive knowledge of Arizona postal history).

The objectives of the proposed organization were:

- 1. Organize a youth education program to stimulate stamp collecting among youth.
- 2. Obtain and preserve postal history of all periods for all of the Western States.
- 3. Gather a collection of historical objects related to the transportation and distribution of the mail.
- 4. Foster the study and research of postal history in all its varied forms.
- 5. Organize a sponsoring society of philatelists, historians, and others who have an interest in promoting and preserving these objectives for future generations.

The organizers then approached Dr. Ray Brandes, Assistant Director of the Arizona Pioneers Historical Society (now the Arizona Historical Society) with the idea of establishing a postal history department at the Society, which came into being as the Western Postal History Mu-

seum (WPHM). As an affiliate of the Society and located within the Society's building, the WPHM nevertheless had to raise its own funds for all its other expenses. The officers were as follows: Bill Alexander, Director; Al Evans, Chief Curator; Omega Williamson, Curator of Research; and Art Springer, Curator of remaining activities. In order to ensure a reliable source of funding to support the WPHM, a separate organization was formed to carry out such activities. Thus was born the Arizona Philatelic Rangers.

Among the first major activities undertaken by the new WPHM was to acquire as much material as possible relating to postal history of the mails in addition to a wide array of stamp materials to support the youth educational activities. The first large donation was received in October 1960, from the Raymond H. Weill Co. of New Orleans, LA, comprised of many books along with a

six volume general collection of stamps. In the years following, Raymond Weill and his brother Roger continued to support the WPHM with several other substantial donations of material. Over the years since, many individuals and organizations have made significant donations to the WPHM, too numerous to list here. A major collection of United States proof and essay stamps was received in 1978 from Stephen D. Bechtel, Sr., the sale of which enabled the WPHM to purchase its own building, the current headquarters at 920 North First Avenue. In


1996 the parents of Peggy Slusser, a long-time volunteer, donated \$750,000 for the construction of the magnificent library that bears her name and stands today as one of the most outstanding philatelic libraries in the country.

The evolution of the Western Postal History Museum into the Postal History Foundation occurred over several years, but it was finalized with the official name change in 1990. The reason for the name change was to reflect the substantial broadening of activities which this institution has undertaken

over the years: specifically to better identify the organization's purpose and scope, to broaden its base of support, and to allow for future program growth and financial security. And as the PHF celebrates its Fiftieth Anniversary, it is evident that it has succeeded beyond expectations as an outstandphilatelic organization that has benefitted not only its membership, youth collectors, the City of Tucson, but also thousands of stamp collectors and philatelists throughout the world.

MICHAEL CUSANOVICH

On Saturday, April 10, the Board of Directors of the PHF held its regular meeting. Two days later, on April 12, Mike Cusanovich died. There was no indication at the meeting that he was ill. It was a shock to all of us. He was only sixtyeight. Mike had been a long -time member of the foundation and a board member for many years.

No doubt he will be most remembered as the Vice-President for Research at the University of Arizona. It was in this capacity that he became famous for his work in biological signaling and energy transduction. He also headed the Arizona Research Laboratories for twenty-two years. Throughout his career, he published more than 300 scientific papers.


As an avid stamp collector, Mike supported the PHF and contributed to its direction. Mike will be missed sorely,

#### PRICILLA WEATHERWAX

Priscilla Weatherwax, a PHF volunteer since 2002, died on May 21, 2010. Priscilla will be remembered especially for her work with the Christmas stamps and her charming conversational abilities. Described as travel-wise, Priscilla, boarding trains, boats, and buses, traveled all over America and many parts of the world. As wide as her world view may have been, she was known at the PHF for her dedication to her volunteer activities and her friendliness.

F. BURTON SELLERS

Burt Sellers of Denver, CO, and Sun City, AZ, was a Ranger since 1985. Burt's accomplishments were many. was one of only three persons to sign the roll of the Philatelic Congress. He won the Lichtenstein Award in 1976, the Luff Award in 1983, and his Haiti collection won three gold medals. He served as chairman of INTERPHIL during 1976, was a member of the Board of Governors of the Collectors Club, and was president of the American Philatelic Society. He has also served in numerous roles on boards of organizations. He died at the age of 91 on June 16.

#### **WILLIAM AINSWORTH**

A Ranger since 1998, William Ainsworth specialized in Abraham Lincoln (1866-1909), postal history in general, and the 6 cent Lincoln stamp. At his recent death, he lived in Roswell, GA, and had a business address in Atlanta.

#### **DEAN CARTER**

On Friday, May 21, Dean Carter, one of our long-time members, died of Parkinson's disease. Dean received his Ph.D from the University of Arizona in chemistry and spent a successful thirty year career there. He received the Education Award for his teaching and the Lifetime Achievement Award for Metals Specialty research.

Dean was a prominent philatelist and supported many activities at the PHF. He was also active in MEPSI.

#### RAYMOND P. MARIELLA

Ray Mariella, of Sun City West, was a Ranger since 1994. He died March 17, 2010. Ray was on the PHF board of directors in 1992 and was president of the Arizona Federation of Stamp Clubs. He lived in Peoria, AZ.

#### **WERNER HELMS**

Werner Helms of Norwalk, CA, a noted collector of German airmail, a specialist in East German courier stamps, and a Ranger since 1992, died this June. Werner was an expert in German philately, a generous contributor to the PHF, a star at many philatelic exhibitions, and a recruiter of many Rangers.

Exhibits and dealers, collectors and visitors, philatelists and judges, stamps and auctions, planes arriving and departing – all were part of the scene at the WESTPEX 2010 50th Annual Stamp Show held at the San Francisco Airport Marriott Hotel on April 23-25. This year's featured societies were the Polonus Philatelic Society and the Scandinavian Collectors Club.

Thanks to the intercession of John Birkinbine, Chairman of the Arizona Philatelic Rangers, and with the cooperation of the show's general manager, Ed Jarvis, the Postal History Foundation was able to have an information table. Since WESTPEX is the best attended show in the western part of the United States, it was an ideal time to spotlight the PHF as it too celebrates its 50th anniversary. Staffing the table were PHF's own Lena Rogers and Paul Nelson, who, during the three days of the show, signed up several new members for the PHF in addition to having one new Ranger join. Making contact with people from different states and foreign countries was a primary objective of having the table. Lena reported that quite a few people picked up informational flyers about PHF's 2011 ARIPEX show to be hosted in Tucson.

Both Lena and Paul expressed pleasure in seeing, once again, Louise Christian and her son George Christian. Louise has been a long time benefactor and supporter of the PHF. They were also able to renew their acquaintance with Wallace Craig, a well-known Southern California philatelist. Furthermore, it was no surprise to both to see many PHF members and Rangers attending the show.

Perhaps one of the most interesting areas of the show was the children's section which included an information and activity table and, more importantly, an activity room. The dedicated room allowed opportunities for interactive philatelic activities and the hands on activities which make stamps and stamp collecting so appealing to children. It is no small wonder children flocked to the area. As an enhancement, the children took a guided tour of the exhibits and the dealer tables. At the PHF table, they collected color-changing pencils and the new collecting fad. erasers. Of course, both were inscribed with the PHF logo and name. Several different California Boy Scout groups also toured the show, another indication of the vouth emphasis at this show.




