Chairman Donates Proceeds from Sale of Collection

For years Bob Bechtel, Chairman of the PHF, has been intrigued by the seven post offices at the Grand Canyon, and, as a result of that fascination, he has been collecting Grand Canyon philatelic material for thirty years or more. The major product of his collecting was an album of material never exhibited which he sold, along with additional materials, at ARIPEX 2011 to Mari and Frank Sente of Prescott. The day following the sale, Bob most generously presented the check in its entirety to the PHF. Such a donation makes it possible for the foundation to carry on several of its important programs. Our thanks extend to Bob for his generosity.

Bob's collection included most of the known extant items related to the Grand Canyon post offices, but he was waiting to exhibit his collection until he could obtain a Grand Canyon Air Crash cover.

His collectiont on the postal history of the Grand Canyon included photos from as early as 1895 of the Tolfree post office; the first known postal item from the Grand Canyon with the

only known cancel from Tolfree; the earliest cancel using the words "Grand Canyon" and the only manuscript cancel known; covers with other rare cancels; private mailing cards; Phantom Ranch cancels; first flight covers; first day of issue of the first Grand Canyon stamp; a leather post card from 1904; a yucca wood post card from 1940; a rare registered letter from the Grand Canyon; and many other covers, cachets, commemorative stamps, and centennials from early times through the present.

A color photo copy of this unusual album is available for viewing at the PHF Slusser Memorial Library.

Chairman's Message

The big news is the tremendous success of ARIPEX. We took in more than \$12, 000 in sales! This is due to the efforts of Bob Davis, John Wynns, Ted Maynard, and others. Another success was the booth that PHF had for children's education (Youth Education thru Stamps) managed by Lisa Dembowski, our education director. The children inundated the exhibit on Friday and dove into the stamp pools positioned on the floor. Everyone could hear the shouts of joy though- out the exhibit hall. And all this was preceded by our conducted tour and PHF reception on Thursday evening, an event planned and largely executed by Paul Nelson. The supper was catered, the bus was full and the seating capacity was overwhelmed. People commented on how wonderful the PHF was as a resource and how they would be back for future visits.

In addition to all this, I sold my collection of the postal history of the Grand Canyon to Marj and Frank Sente of Prescott. They will no doubt exhibit this collection soon, but the best parts of the collection have been photocopied and are available at the PHF for any who want to see them.

Rare Revenue Papers Displayed

In consideration of MEPSI, the Mexican specialist group which was one of the guest societies at ARIPEX, the PHF made arrangements with the Special Collections Library at the University of Arizona to borrow a selection of historic documents from their archives. The chairman of the PHF library committee, Dick King, made the introductions that allowed this to occur.

The documents all are "papel sellado", or "stamped revenue paper". They range from the late 1700s through the 1860s, and show the development of the use of these papers from New Spain, through several revolutions, up to the early days to the Republic of Mexico.

The paper, imported from Spain, had a stamped imprint of the royal seal and a denomination for the tax paid by using the paper. These papers were valid for a two year period.

Looking toward ARIPEX 2013, when the American Revenue Association and The State Revenue Society will be guest societies in Tucson, we hope to expand upon this generous loan and dig further into what must be a significant and philatelically untouched array of papeles at the Special Collections Library.

Arizona Postal History Display Panels

Thanks to an LSTA grant, the library now has two display panels on Arizona's Postal History, featuring stamps, covers, photos, postcards, and a map. Beginning with the first written communication and leading up to Territorial Days, the first panel includes a description of Butterfield Overland Mail and Mail by Rail. The second panel covers the period from Statehood to the present and documents the first air mail flight in Arizona by Katherine Stinson to a glimpse of assorted post offices from around the state. The panels collapse and are easily portable, so can be lent to other organizations or used at special events. A second set of panels is on semi-permanent display in the Capitol Museum in Phoenix.





ARIPEX 2011

The ever popular KIDS' ZONE was the destination at ARIPEX 2011 in Tucson January 14-16. Ten bus loads of kids arrived from Tucson plus many car loads from private and home school groups. There is nothing like 750 kids swarming around stamp wading pools and philatelic activities. We provided over 25 activities for kids and adults of all ages. Thanks to our fantastic volunteers and the show chairman, Steve Staton, we were able to spread out over 1,400 square feet and monitor our KIDS' Zone. One of our volunteer /board members, Barrett Behnke, is good with his hands and builds what is needed out of wood for the stamp activities that I design. An example of this is our beautiful 54 slot sorting box which was used by the students to sort the mail from every state and Washington D.C. New activities added this year included: U.S. Map using postmarks from cities in each state, Civil War Worksheets, Sort the Mail, Foreign Stamp Pool, Fun with Cancels, ABCs, Insects, Lewis and Clark, and Mail Transportation (Old and New). All ages were represented in our activities in the KIDS' Zone and adults visited the KIDS' ZONE to have fun also!

Besides the Kid Zone excitement there were nine competitive youth exhibits. Six of these were novice exhibitors from right here in Tucson who had attended our Stamp Camp for the last two years. Excitement was in the air as all their hard work and dedication paid off. The six boys earned five silver and one silver-bronze medals. The happiness and pride on their faces was priceless. They were also given special Pokemón and Harry Potter souvenir sheets by the PHF as part of their awards.

Old Tucson Studios

The annual Ted Walker Days event at Old Tucson Studios is a complete day of fun for over 3,000 kids as they experience the Old West and learn about astronomy, the environment, philately, biology, and other interesting topics at booths set up by local educational organizations. Our tables were busy all day with kids huddled around our treasure chests of stamps! Most of the students spent a great deal of time picking out the exact stamps that they wanted. They were impressed with the fact that we had thousands of stamps to choose from,(a fraction of what we have at the PHF), and they thought stamps were "cool!"







Padre Kino's Legacy To Be Celebrated

On March 15, 2011, the Postal History Foundation will join with the Kino Heritage Society (KHS) of Tucson to commemorate the 300th anniversary of the death of Father Eusebio Francisco Kino, in Magdalena, Sonora, Mexico.

Father Kino was born in Italy, and after his education as a Jesuit came to Mexico where he worked in the Pimeria Alta (Northern Mexico and Southern Arizona). Incredibly talented and compassionate, Father Kino was a missionary pioneer, teacher, cartographer, explorer, and an advocate for the native peoples he encountered through his missionary work. He founded San Xavier del Bac

Mission just outside Tucson.

In 1987 Mexico issued a stamp (Scott 1474) on the occasion of the 300th anniversary of Padre Kino's arrival to the Pimeria Alta. It depicts a profile of Father Kino against a background of the map of the Pimeria Alta Kino made as a cartographer.

In 1971 the U.S. issued a stamp of the San Xavier Mission as part of the Historic Preservation set of that year. (Scott 1443).

As part of the current commemorative activities, the PHF is working with the Kino Heritage Society to create two cacheted covers and a commemora-

tive cancel. The cachets promote two different monuments dedicated to Padre Kino, one in 1936 and the other in 1989. The cachets were created by Don Regole of Regole Design.

Time requirements have not allowed an official United States stamp to be issued by the postal service, so the KHS has created a personal postage stamp that has postal validity within the United States.

The event will be held on the PHF premises on March 15, 2011, from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. and is open to the public

Padre Kino's Legacy To Be Celebrated

Arizona will celebrate 100 years of statehood on February 14, 2012, and incidentally, that date gave the state the nickname of "The Valentine State." From a philatelic standpoint, it would be most satisfying to have an envelope cancelled on the date of statehood celebration with some accompaniment inside related to the celebration. No such luck – so far.

From a historic standpoint, the item photocopied here comes close to these requirements. The information on the card indicates that after attending the statehood celebration at the capitol, someone who signs the post card as "Johnie" describes the event: (There is no salutation, only an address to Mr. Harry A. Blizzard of Fonda lowa.)

I am sending this card to show you how they grow "the trees."


These were loaded with fruit when we saw them. Yesterday a big day here & we are a state, Heard Bryan for two hours on city plaza yesterday – it speaks well for the western-southern state that we saw only one man – a well dressed me – that we knew had been drinking. Hurrah! for Zony

The closing cannot be deciphered. The card face shows the Orange Grove Five in Salt River Valley, Arizona. The cancel shows the date of Feb. 15, 1912, the first day of statehood. The "two hours" from Bryan refer to William Jennings Bryan, the guest speaker.

While this item leaves much to be desired in terms of beauty and veracity (only one man drinking), it definitely is a link to the event by someone who was there. In modern times there would be a large commemorative cancel with many signatures of celebrities. But this card is all we have directly from that event. I would be delighted to hear from anyone who owns or knows of any similar items. This item was purchased many years ago from John Birkinbine.

And then there is the question of value. I would like to hear from our readers as to what they think such an item is worth. Responses may be emailed to bechtel@u.arizona.edu.

MEMORIAL

Gratia Jochimsen

Gratia Jochimsen, a PHF member and a past volunteer for many years, died on Sept. 12, 2010. She was an avid stamp collector, but everyone knew her as a friend and considered her to be sweetness personified. She is especially remembered for her perseverance in coming weekly to the post office located on the PHF premises to buy new stamp issues in spite of the physical difficulties she had to overcome to do so. Her softspoken words to all she met will be missed.

Civil War Patriotic Envelopes Donated

The Postal History Foundation has received the Thomas Hale Collection of Civil War Patriotic Envelopes from a donor. There are approximately 2000 different historic and colorful pieces of stationery in the collection, all unused envelopes mostly from the Union states, but a few Confederate designs are included. The freshness and brightness of the entire group of envelopes is very unusual; they have been stored for many years in a family trunk, fortunately in the dry Southwestern climate of Tucson. Many are hand colored and all are essentially in the mint condition in which they were acquired many years ago.

The envelopes have been organized based on the categories that were published in the Catalog of Union Civil War Patriotic Covers by William R. Weiss in 1995. For long- term preservation, each envelope has been placed in a mylar sleeve with the Weiss catalog number on the sleeve.

Documentation accompanying the donated material includes 1941 dated correspondence among Thomas Hale, Hugh M. Clark, and H.L. Lindquist discussing the collection. Also as a frame of reference, there is a prices realized document from the George Walcott sale of used patriotic covers from 1934. The original inventory, done by Thomas



Hale and based on the Walcott numbers, is included.

The donor's grandfather, Thomas Hale, wrote that he remembers he and his sister occasionally played with these envelopes as children. Based on the condition of the envelopes, it is obvious the children were not allowed to play hard with the material. The donor's great-grandfather, also named Thomas Hale, was the collector who put this material together.

With this year being celebrated as the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, and with the recent release of a new book, Patriotic Envelopes of the Civil War: The Iconography of Union and Confederate Covers, by Steven R. Boyd, the subject matter of the Thomas Hale Collection should be of interest to many historians and philatelists. The collection is available for study by appointment.
