

The TUGSON Cancel Error

are less popular for collectors than errors in the printing of stamps, yet they are probably scarcer. An interesting example is the misspelling of Tucson at the Greenway station in Tucson. There was a Greenway Rural Station from Dec.1, 1929, until Feb. 15, 1955, and then the Greenway contract branch location at the Veteran's Hospital from Feb. 16, 1955 to 1973. The error seems to have a relatively long life of more than three years. The first known cancel with the

Errors in postmark cancels error is dated March 16, 1933, and the last known dated October 2, 1942. The error of the "G" is quite clear in 1933 (Figure 1) but becomes blurred so that the "G" is not clear in the latter year (Figure 2). What is mysterious about this error is why it lasted so long. The Postal History Foundation has forty copies of this cancel in its archives. How could such an error last so long? Didn't the station postmaster notice? Or was it just too much trouble to get a new cancel? We'll never know. -Bob Bechtel

Letter to the Editor:

[The following excerpt is taken from a letter Bob Bechtel received in response to his article "World's First Commemorative" in Stamp Tracks, No. 16 (Spring 2011). With permission from the writer, it is printed here as a letter to the editor.]

With all due respect, unless your old *Linn's* source is using an uncommonly restrictive definition of "commemorative," the article is in error by five years. Every definition that I am familiar with includes memorial or mourning stamps issued within a year of a major person's death as a "commemorative" stamp.

Accordingly, the World's First Commemorative would be U.S. Scott No. 77, the memorial stamp for President Abraham Lincoln issued in April 1866. This was established in various articles and is the earliest according to the National Postal Museum at the Smithsonian Institution. In particular, see Eliot A. Landau's "The 1866-68 15c Black: History, First Day, Production Varieties and Uses of the First U.S. Commemorative" in *The Chronicle*, Vol. 54, No. 1-2 (February 2002 and May 2002): 17-31 and 100-111.

Summer is HOT with activities in the YES Education Department!

Summer Stamp Camp 2011

We had three groups of kids participating in Stamp Camp over a two week period. This year we offered three different levels because the kids wanted to keep coming back for more stamp activities and learning opportunities. This summer's Super Advanced group was especially enthusiastic after having entered exhibits in ARIPEX 2011 and after having experienced the joy of winning there. The Beginning "campers" were able to learn about the history of stamps, how to hinge stamps, and how to identify stamps by country. They studied stamp types and topics on stamps while learning to use basic stamp collecting tools. After studying ways of starting a collection, they were then set on the path to start personal collections starting with the resources at the PHF. The Advanced group learned about cancellations and postmarks, perfins and metered mail, and stamp grading. The Super Advanced group was kept busy learning about the stamp printing process, postal delivery, postage rates, and zip code geography. The highlight of the week for them was making hand-made paper with a personally designed watermark.

Owney Finally Gets His Day of Glory!

Owney, the Railway Mail Service dog and the postal employees who cared for him, finally received due recognition when the U.S. Postal Service issued a new stamp on July 27, 2011. The Postal History Foundation created four different cachets for the First Day of Issue, one by Dave Bennett, and three by Don Regole. Regole also designed a special Owney cancel to be used at the time of the stamp's release. To celebrate the event, the PHF started activities with a special story time about Owney with guest storyteller Mr. Ed, a very popular local storyteller. Before story time, Rodger Freitag of the USPS in Tucson unveiled the Owney stamp. Afterwards, the children created stories with stamps, made bookmarks with dog stamps from around the world, designed their own animal stamps, and had fun looking through the treasure chests of stamps. Adults attending had time to tour the PHF facilities and buy the new stamps and cachets, and enjoy refreshments. All proceeds from the sale of the cachets benefit the Youth Education thru Stamps (YES) program of the Foundation.



Peculiar Parcel Post

Her name was May Pierstroff. Just four years old, she was a petite little girl weighing only 481/2 pounds. She so wanted to visit her grandmother in Lewiston, Idaho, 100 miles away from her hometown of Grangeville, Idaho, but there were no roads and train tickets were expensive in the year 1914. Enter the U.S. Postal Service! Classify the little blond girl as a baby chick, attach fifty-three cents worth of postage stamps to a tag on her coat, put her in the baggage car, and with the help of a kind-hearted mail clerk, May would reach her destination.

Why the fifty-three cents of postage? While it was illegal to mail live animals (with the exception of baby chicks), there were no restrictions on the books against mailing people, and May's cost was equivalent to that of 48 pounds of baby chicks.

Accounts of May's story and other children being mailed are mentioned in James H. and Donald J. Burns' book Reaching Rural America – The Evolution of Rural Free Delivery. May's story also has been fictionalized in a wonderful children's book Mailing May by Michael Tunnell available at the Slusser Memorial Library.
