Historic Building Inspires Grand Winner

Many residents of Tucson have great affection for the historic neon signs and buildings in the city. Roark Polzin is a young man in high school who already has an appreciation for such iconic and historical sites in his home town. This is reflected in his winning entry for the 9th Annual Tucson Birthday Stamp Design.

Celebrated annually in Tucson, August 20, 1775 is the official birthday of the city. Every year, the Postal History Foundation hosts a birthday stamp contest to bring recognition to the art of stamps, stamp collecting, the history of Tucson, and the art of our local children.

Roark is no stranger to the contest, having placed in

the top five of his age group two years ago when he designed a cityscape of Tucson. His work was chosen for a cachet on one of six collectible envelopes that we produce to celebrate the top winners.

Last year, Roark was not quite satisfied with his design for the 2015 contest and never submitted his picture.

This year, Roark Polzin persevered and felt positive enough about his work to enter. He used colored drawing markers to create his picture of the iconic "Diving Lady" sign and the old Willard Hotel building from which it hangs. In recent years, much of downtown Tucson has undergone improvements as part of revitalization projects. The Piccarreta Davis law firm, which owns the building and the sign, renovated the Willard Hotel in 1993 and restored the Diving Lady to her former glory in 2012. The well-known sign can be

seen at 145 South 6th Ave. While sightseeing downtown it is worthwhile dropping in to look at building and the lobby, which is filled with historic photo-



graphs and other artist renditions of the property. Renowned architect Henry C. Trost designed the building, and it was built by Willard Wright. When it opened in September of 1902, the Arizona Daily Citizen described the hotel "as a marvel: it is simply ahead of anything in the Southwest ..."

Roark decided to draw the sign and building because he

"really likes the building and they drive by it every day." It took him a few hours a day for a week to complete his masterpiece.

Lisa Dembowski, Education Director at the Postal History Foundation, asked Michael Piccarreta, one of the owners of the building, to be a surprise guest and give Roark his awards and sheet of stamps. Mr. Piccarreta was gracious enough to attend and he talked

about the history of the building and famous sign.

As I Knew Him by Ted Maynard

The following is a piece written by our current treasurer, Ted Maynard. We miss Harold W. (Bill) Kohl terribly, but we are thankful for his hard work, dedication to our foundation, his smile, and kindness to everyone.

Bill Kohl and I met in the later stages of life as fellow volunteers at the Postal History Foundation. That was a bit over six years ago. On most every Tuesday and Thursday for those six years, from 0700-1300, Bill and I joined forces to manage the financial affairs of the Foundation.

Bill, also known as "Doc," was Treasurer from 2003-2011. In a small nonprofit, that role is important, but can be hazardous with its own unique accounting and tax rules. I do not know how he got roped into taking the job. I do know that he was diligent in the pursuit of accuracy and thoroughness. In recent years he served as Vice-Chairman (and honorary Chancellor of the Exchequer).

At first we shared a desk and a half in the populated and busy main (greeting and sorting) room. While a place of constant and congenial banter, the space did not lend itself to proper processing and completion of a Treasurer's tasks.

Bill engineered a shifting of offices and we established the unofficial

"Finance Department" in an appropriate space. Well, "much better" might be more correct, as a main pas-

sage (and a regular guided tour stop) ran in front of Bill's desk. He thought about charging a toll as a new fundraising tool. Bill was my mentor in the history and ways of the Postal History Foundation. And, as you might imagine, this Tucson native provided a colorful history of the city as seen from living in the early Foothills and as a practicing internal medicine physician for more than 35 years.

An Arizona Philatelic Ranger and stamp collector, Bill was also a seasoned and experienced backpacker. I heard about many trips down into the Grand Canyon to the Havasu. I learned of the Ute name of Uncompaghre, the sixth highest peak in Colorado and of the Weminuche Wilderness.

Family was a great foundation and strength as Bill aged. He delighted in his wife Rose Ann and his children. May we all be as beautifully strong and consistent in our family ties.

Bill was a man of substance. He was kind and listened well, but did not hesitate to note questionable or incorrect positions that I might express. Intelligent, thoughtful – a man of good character. What more could I ask for in a mentor!

So, to you, "Doc," I say a sad farewell. May you be resting in peace with Rose Ann. I shall never forget you or the role you played in my recent years. Most of all, I remember you as my friend.

Star Trek Celebrations \

The sun, moon, and stars aligned for a two-day *Star Trek* event hosted by the Postal History Foundation. On Friday, September 2, William Schwartz, then Tucson postmaster, joined a standing-room-only crowd

for a local unveiling of the set of four *Star Trek* stamps that commemorate the iconic television show's 50th anniversary. In addition, the foundation began sales of a set of four, full-color "first day covers" (collectible envelopes) that include the new stamps, the USPS pictorial postmark, and beautiful envelope artwork by local graphic designer Don Regole. Several audience members dressed the part for the unveiling, ready to jump into a warp-drive of fun and adventure.

The following star date, more of the community beamed over for the *Star Trek* Fete. Food offerings included Tribble Bites (French macaroons), Horta Eggs (M and M's) and Tholian Pretzel cups, Vulcan Veggies, and Regulation Federation Hydration (water). Kids enjoyed a variety of children's activities, such as Starfleet paper doll-making, se-tenant matching, and space



Slusser Library Celebration Honors Origins

The Honorable Jonathan Rothschild, Mayor of Tucson, proclaimed October 8, 2016, as Slusser Library Cele-

bration Day. Mr. Rothschild revealed in his speech that he had worked with Peggy Slusser early in his career. He remembered her hand writing down countless names in ledgers, and while Peggy's fingers were curled from arthritis, her penmanship was always beautiful.

Librarian Valerie Kittell addressed the audience and told a little of Peggy Slusser's life and her parents' devotion to her. She expressed that the library building is symbolic of Blaine and Bessie Slusser's deep love for their daughter, and the work done in the library building represents Peggy's character and interests.



Librarian Valerie Kittell accepted the mayor's proclamation, which states:

WHEREAS, the Slusser Library provides a vital service in connecting people with information; and WHEREAS, the Slusser Library preserves and provides access to materials that may be unique and otherwise unavailable; and WHEREAS, the Slusser Library serves people from all over the world in a variety of philatelic, Arizona history, and Civil War topics; and WHEREAS, the Slusser Library, one of the few philatelic libraries in the country, is a unique and valuable resource in Tucson; and WHEREAS, the Slusser Library was built and is main-



tained through the generosity of Blaine and Bessie Slusser, given in memory of their daughter Peggy Jean; and WHEREAS, members of the Postal History Foundation worked tirelessly to facilitate the construction of the Slusser Library; and WHEREAS, the Postal History Foundation celebrates the twentieth anniversary of the dedication of the Slusser Library; NOW THEREFORE, I, Jonathan Rothschild, Mayor of the City of Tucson, Arizona, do hereby proclaim October 8, 2016 to be Slusser Library Celebration Day in this community and encourage our residents to appreciate the Slusser Library as an exceptional resource, a distinctive feature in Tucson, and a contributor to the global community.









