Youth and Adult Learners Supported by PHF

Guest Contribution by Robert Alexander Cagna

Over the past several years, I've had the pleasure of working with the Postal History Foundation's (PHF) Education Director Lisa Dembowski, Librarian/Archivist Valerie Kittell and the volunteers of the PHF... but not in the way most people do.

You see, I live in West Virginia, and have never been to Tucson. I'm the library director of a university health sciences library. I love philately, postal history, stamps, and postcards, and I wanted to share my passion with others. The PHF has helped me immensely.

One day I spoke with our local Montessori school's administration about the possibility of my giving stamp talks to their various classes of elementary school children. They were enthusiastic, and told me the students presently were studying the four

seasons of the year and ocean life. Lisa and the volunteers put together relevant work

pages, stamps and supplies about the ocean and the four seasons, as well as a great selection of world stamps for the kids. I gave my presentation in classrooms full of students, and of course, the children loved it! I went back a second time to give more stamp talks and share stamp collecting tips with the students.

I had seen in *Stamp Tracks* that PHF offered stamp treasure chests to schools to encourage philately and learning. Since I work at a medical

library, I thought it would be wonderful, in a similar way, to promote stamps related to the history of medicine. We could offer the stamps to students, faculty, and medical residents. We did that by first requesting stamps from the PHF, and, after receiving them, we offered a basket of stamps for browsing. Patrons could choose five stamps each, and we also offered glassine envelopes.

I was beginning to see that the PHF mission applies to adults, too. I brought to my lectures topically-related stamps provided by the PHF. I also gave presentations at national library and book-related conferences, and, again, the PHF helped with supplying stamps related to my talks. I'm sure this made the talks more memorable and, hopefully, introduced to the attendees that stamps are useful for adult learning.

This summer I gave a workshop to twenty rare book librarians and booksellers, titled "Every Stamp Tells a Story: How Postage Stamps, Postal Stationery, Postcards and Other Postal Ephemera from the 18th Century to Today are Historically Important to



Thank you very much Lisa, Valerie, and all the volunteers of the Postal History Foundation. I couldn't have done it without you.



The Story Behind the Story of Arizona Airmail



High in Desert Skies: Early Arizona Aviation, William Kalt III. Published in Tucson, 2017. Perfect-bound, 217 pages. ISBN 9780998239903. Available for purchase through Amazon (don't forget to use www.smile.amazon.com), in bookstores, and at Mr. Kalt's website, http://www.highindesertskies.com/.

William Kalt's latest book tells the story of pioneer flights, early aviation enterprises, airports, and, of special interest to philatelists, airmail in Arizona through engaging discussion, illustrations, and photographs.

The book, divided into twenty-six short chapters, paints several vignettes of the many people and events that participated in and shaped the nascent and formative years of Arizona aviation, including Charles Hamilton, Cal Rodgers, Gates M. Fowler, Katherine Stinson, Major T.C. Macaulay, World War I Ace Ralph Ambrose O'Neill, Barr's Flying Circus, and Charles Lindbergh's 1927 visit to Tucson. He also chronicles the first aerial filming of the Grand Canyon and efforts to

establish airfields. Thoroughly researched and well-supported (bibliographic references, pages 199-211), Mr. Kalt's book captures the excitement, drama, and uncertainty of the period when the dangers, benefits, and future of flying were still very much unknown.

In Memoriam

Thierry Delespesse, an active volunteer and member of the Postal History Foundation, passed away recently.

Thierry worked as a chef and was also a keen philatelist. He collected many specialties, including Belgium, military postal history, worldwide meter mail, seapost mail, and more. Thierry was a native of Belgium, where he met his wife, Julie, who was serving in the United States Air Force there. After marriage, they were posted in several foreign countries, including Portugal, Turkey, and Belgium.

After retiring to Tucson they spent time in China, where Julie taught English. This past year they were in Viet Nam to teach English again when Thierry fell ill. They returned to Tucson, where he passed away.

Thierry's good nature and good humor enhanced the Postal History Foundation. Many of us will fondly remember both his kindness and his wit.

He will be missed.





New Philatelic Ranger Members Inducted

The Arizona Philatelic Rangers are pleased to welcome new members Alexander Schauss and Laura Schauss.

Dr. Alexander Schauss arrived as a child with his German family to New York City in 1953. He eventually found his way to downtown Manhattan, where numerous stamp dealers occupied shops around Nassau Street. In time, he became a runner for many of the dealers, taking valuable stamps and collections from one store or office to another. This developed into a serious interest in United States revenue stamps over several decades and the building of a major collection. In 2012, Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries held the Dr. Alexander Schauss Collection of United States Revenue Stamps sale. The foundation's library holds a copy of this name sale catalog.

Dr. Schauss is a part-time world-wide stamp dealer specializing in U.S. state revenues and Southeast Asian philately with a focus on Indonesia. He is a member of the ASDA, APS, ARA, ATA, and Dai Nippon. Alex presently collects Washington State Revenues, and is now forming an exhibit of Java from 1945 to 1949. An associate research scientist in the College of Science, Department of Geosciences, at the University of Arizona, he is also a noted food scientist and a Fellow of the American College of Nutrition.

Dr. Schauss is also an avid mineral collector and has been a mineral judge at the internationally known Tucson Gem and Mineral Show for decades. He has spearheaded a legislation to have wulfenite, a beautiful lead molybdate mineral, become the official state mineral of Arizona.

Laura Schauss grew up in Renton, Washington and later Orcas Island in the San Juan Islands, off the shore of Washington state.

Her long-term interests in cartography and art led her to collect maps on stamps and nudes on stamps. She is a member of the CartoPhilatelic Society.

As a co-owner of Schauss Philatelics, Mrs. Schauss also travels to many stamp shows, meeting dealers and collectors, always in search of new items for her collections.

Laura Schauss is the Chief Operating Officer of the American Institute for Biosocial and Medical Research, headquartered in Seattle, Washington, with office and staff in several states, including Arizona.

The Schausses enjoy living in Oro Valley, Arizona, just north of Tucson.



In the "Loupe"

The basement in the Slusser Library has a new dedicated purpose: "closed stacks," meaning a section of the library that stores library collections, but is not open to the public. In its previous life, the basement was used as a workspace, and as storage not only for library materials, but also general Postal History Foundation overflow. Over the years, as more library and archival materials were processed and less work was performed in the basement, it became abundantly clear that the area needed a new design to accommodate the archives' holdings.



Donations would be greatly appreciated to help cover the cost of acquiring proper archival housing of these unbound journals.

The librarian/archivist, Valerie Kittell, designed, and, with help from volunteers, executed a major reorganization of the basement layout that included shifting hundreds of materials and disassembling and reassembling existing shelving. New shelving units purchased with a grant from the Arizona Historical Society provided additional space to house archival and museum collections.

Seven dedicated sections house auction catalogs, stamp show programs, journals, rare books and journals, archival collections, museum objects not on display, and unprocessed material. Each section has room for collections to grow. A large table was left in the basement for as-needed workspace.

These dedicated sections, along with ample aisle space, allow for easy access to collections and an improved workflow.
