## THE FIRST CANADA / U.S. TREATY

During the time frame of this exhibit, there were no direct Transcanada Postal Routes; therefore, virtually all such mail went through the San Francisco Post Office.

The 21/2d. stamps paid only the Colonial fee, the LIS. postage being marked at san francisco circular "30" ( 30 cents collect).


IETTER travelled by the Overland Mail, - note ms. direction "Overland", and it was stamped with blue crescent "ll-states" border marking. Backstamp shows that it reached Bowmanville July 24, 1861, 22 days from san Francisco.

This cover is from the Gerald Wellburn collection. In admiration and respect, it is presented on his page without further comment.

## Arizona Apollo 13 Covers

By Robert B. Bechtel

The covers say, "3rd US Moon Landing." Hardly. But adding to the recent publicity over Apollo 13 from the movie and the few scarce covers carried on board the ill-fated craft, Arizona makes its own humble contribution. Three observation stations were used for the Apollo series that were in Arizona: the Smithsonian observatory atop Mount Hopkins in the Santa Rita Mountains, south of Tucson; the U.S. Naval Surveillance station at Maricopa, west of Phoenix; and the U.S. Naval Observatory at Flagstaff. Each location received the same cachet and was cancelled at the nearby post office on April 11, the day the spacecraft was launched.

The cachet shows how the landing might be imagined, but alas, never took place. The cancels are ordinary machine cancels for Flagstaff (Figure 1) and Maricopa (Figure 2) but the Amado cancel (Figure 3) is a nice large four-bar. The choice of Amado was because it was the closest town to the observatory on Mt. Hopkins but Green Valley is also close by and much larger.
These three covers remain a sad footnote to the Apollo 13 drama. They were not carried aboard nor were they part of the effort itself to make another moon landing. They were part of a series stretching from Apollo 10 to Apollo 17 using the same three stations plus others such as Mt. Lemmon. The covers from Apollo 14 used the same cachet design, but the others were different, some being quite intricate. An unknown philatelist made the cachets and did the work of obtaining the cancels. If any reader knows who made these designs, please contact me care of the Postal History Foundation. I want to tell the cachet maker he has a problem.
